


#### Your One-Stop Shop for Student Apps

#### Our Commitment to Providing Financial Support for Students

We believe that expensive tuition and associated costs should not prevent students from receiving a quality education. Our Financial Aid & Scholarships Department is dedicated to helping students access grants, scholarships and other resources to make college affordable.

The **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** is a federal application and the primary means of applying for financial aid at colleges and universities in the United States. It is completed by students each year they want to be considered for financial aid. California uses information entered on the FAFSA to award state grants like Cal Grant.

# **Types of Aid**



**Grants**: Students are eligible for grants based on their demonstrated financial need, which is determined by their FAFSA application. Grants are free money and do not require repayment.

**Loans**: Loans must be repaid. Students who are eligible may borrow loans from either the government or a private source.

**California College Promise Grant** (Formerly BOG Fee Waiver): Eligible students can apply for this state-sponsored program to have their enrollment fees waived. This grant is an excellent option for students who are not eligible for federal financial aid.

**Federal Work Study** (**FWS**): The Federal Work Study (FWS) program provides part-time jobs to undergraduate students with financial need, allowing them to earn money and gain work experience while receiving pay for educational expenses.

**Scholarships**: Delta offers a variety of scholarships every academic year, both campus-issued and outside-issued. Requirements for each scholarship may vary.

**Students in Health Professions**: The Health Professions Education Foundation is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) public benefit corporation that provides financial assistance to health professional students throughout California who are willing to practice in medically underserved areas.

Designed to increase the matriculation, retention, and graduation rates of students of African descent, this program's unique structure and cultural enrichment offerings will provide you with the Valley's Own HBCU Experience. Students will be enrolled in two 8-week courses at a time while still completing 12-units per semester. Whether you are a first-time college student, a current high school student or a working adult, this program is for you!

#### **EMPOWERING POSITIVE INITIATIVES & CHANGES (EPIC):**

The EPIC Learning Community supports college success for Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) students, with a focus on exploring topics related to self-awareness, personal growth, cultural identity, written and oral communication through the lens of the AAPI experience.

#### PUENTE: BUILDING BRIDGES FOR TRANSFER:

Puente is a nationally-recognized program that provides academic support to first-generation, low-income college students in calculus-based fields in Mathematics, Engineering and Sciences. This Learning Community consists of three interrelated components: writing, counseling/personal development, and mentoring.

#### MATH ENGINEERING SCIENCE ACHIEVEMENT (MESA):

Delta's MESA program provides academic support to first-generation, low-income college students in calculus-based fields in Mathematics, Engineering and Sciences. The program is part of a statewide continuum of services that work with students from 6th grade through to their Bachelor's degree.

#### DIRECTING ADULTS ON THE RIGHT TRAC FOR EMPLOYMENT (DARTE):

DARTE's cohort model is designed for working adults. Students can earn high school diploma credits and college units at the same time while learning about career options and developing lifelong skills.



### **NEW STUDENT CHECKLIST**



1.	Apply for Admission
	Students can start by visiting <b>deltacollege.edu</b> . In the upper right-hand corner, click the yellow "APPLY" icon and then the "Start Your Application" icon to begin. Be sure to create the CCCApply account <i>and</i> complete the application. After submitting the application, students should receive a welcome email with their student ID number within 2 business days.
2.	Access Your MyDelta Dashboard
	Students will receive a series of emails after applying to Delta College. One of those emails will provide students with their <b>Delta ID number</b> , <b>Delta College email address</b> , and a <b>link</b> prompting them to activate their MyDelta Dashboard. Students need to activate their account and set a password. For assistance accessing the account or resetting the password, students can use the Delta College LiveChat feature on the bottom right corner by visiting <b>deltacollege.edu</b> or visit the Delta Connect Center located on the first floor of the DeRicco Student Services Building.
3.	Apply for Financial Aid
	Students can complete the FAFSA at https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa or the California Dream Act Application at https://dream.csac.ca.gov/landing. For questions or assistance with these applications, students can reach out to the Delta College Financial Aid Department by visiting https://bit.ly/DC_FIN_AID.
4.	Complete New Student Orientation
	Students can access New Student Orientation through their "TASKS" tile in their MyDelta portal. There are multiple ways to complete the orientation. Completing the New Student Orientation is required to meet priority registration criteria.

	To complete priority registration criteria, meeting with a counselor is required.
