RESOLUTION ORDERING THE FORMATION OF COUNTY SERVICE AREA No. 39, WESTERN WORLD

WHEREAS, the property owners of the hereinafter described territory filed a petition with the Local Agency Formation Commission of San Joaquin County requesting the formation of a county service area for the 98 acre Western World development project; and,

WHEREAS, said Local Agency Formation Commission conducted a duly noticed public hearing on said proposal on April 12, 1985 and determined that a county service area should be formed to provide domestic water, storm drainage, sanitary sewer, street lighting, fire protection, and police protection services; and,

WHEREAS, as a result of said public hearing, the Local Agency Formation Commission did adopt Resolution No. 646 entitled "Resolution Approving Formation of County Service Area No. 39, Western World, and Adoption of Sphere of Influence (LAFC 9-85)" which authorized this Board of Supervisors to proceed with this formation without notice and hearing and without an election in accordance with Section 54797.1 of the Government Code; and,

WHEREAS on May 7, 1985 this Board considered the proposal and adopted Board Order B-85-745 which asked for the additional service of parks and recreation to be included as a latent power,

and requested a report from the various County officials pursuant to Section 25210.20 of the Government Code; and,

WHEREAS, the Local Agency Formation Commission met on May 17, 1985 and considered and approved the request to add parks and recreation services as an additional service of County Service Area No. 39, Western World; and,

WHEREAS, the aforementioned report was reviewed and considered by this Board on May 21, 1985;

IT IS, THEREFORE, RESOLVED, and this Board does hereby find and determine, that it is for the best interests of the residents and property owners in the hereinafter described territory that County Service Area No. 39, Western World, be established.

IT-IS FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board does hereby find and determine that the improvement, maintenance, and operation of extended domestic water, storm drainage, sanitary sewer, and street lighting services within said county service area are extended County services.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that extended domestic water, storm drainage, sanitary sewer, and street lighting services shall be paid for by annual service charges collected pursuant to the provisions of Article 7 (commencing with Section 25210.70 thereof) of Chapter 2.2 of Part 2 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the Government Code of the State of California. The service area shall not assume responsibility for said miscellaneous extended services until the aforementioned service charges are collected.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that extended parks and recreation

services are hereby determined to be a latent power of this county service area to be provided only at such time in the future that the residents and landowners present to the Board of Supervisors a plan that has met with the approval of the County Director of Parks and Recreation and a method of financing the requested services through special taxes and upon the approval of those taxes by a two-thirds vote of eligible voters of this county service area.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that extended police and fire protection services are not currently authorized extended services for County Service Area No. 39, Western World. They can be added later as provided in Section 25210.30 et seq. of the Government Code at such time as the proponents develop a specific plan for the requested service or services and a specific method of collecting the revenue necessary to implement the proposed service.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that pursuant to Section 54790.3 of the Government Code there is no transfer of property tax revenues as a result of this county service area formation.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the boundaries of County Service Area No. 39, Western World, shall be as set forth in the legal description thereof which is attached hereto, marked Exhibit A, and made a part hereof, and as shown upon map attached hereto, marked Exhibit B, and made a part hereof.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that this county service area is hereby established without an election and without notice and hearing pursuant to Section 25210.14 of the Government Code.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors is hereby directed to forward seven certified copies of this resolution to the Executive Officer of the Local Agency Formation Commission of San Joaquin County so that he may make the filings required by Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 56450) of Part 5 of Division 1 of Title 6 of the Government Code.



PROPOSAL: Application was filed by petition of property owners proposing to form CSA #39 encompassing the 98 acre Western World development project. Authorized services would include domestic , water, storm drainage, sanitary sewer, and street lighting. is located at the northwest corner of Highway 99 and Liberty Road, extending west to Lower Sacramento Road and north to the golf course. If approved, subsequent formation proceeding will be conducted by the County Board of Supervisors.

The Western World proposal is a combined commercial, DISCUSSION: recreational, and residential development with an "old west" theme focused on equestrian arenas and county entertain-The residential portion has been approved by the County as the Villa Chaparral tentative subdivision with 182 residential lots.

The tentative subdivision map requires that public water, sanitary sewer, and storm drainage be provided. Sanitary sewers are to be extended from the City of Galt. A County Service Area is required for maintanence and operation of domestic water and storm drainage.

Since the tentative map also requires that police and fire protection services be provided in a manner subject to the approval of the Board of Supervisors, both Planning and Public Works have asked that extended police and fire be authorized services of the CSA. These are added for use only in the event that they are needed to resolve issues which may arise upon approval of the Final Map by the Board of Supervisors.

LAFC 9-85 Page 2

The historical use of the property is grazing. It is not prime agricultural soils. Further, the U.S. Soil Conservation Service advises that, due to extensive grading, the site has no classification for agricultural purposes.

In accordance with State Law, LAFCo must determine the amount of property tax dollars which would be transferred to a newly formed district. In this case the proposed CSA would not assume any services which are currently tax funded, and therefore, no tax dollars would be transferred.

Upon County approval, the Board of Supervisors, as lead agency, adopted an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and "statement of overriding considerations" for the project. A copy of the EIR has been provided for Commissioners review, and the "statement" is attached. The Commission must adopt the same or a similar "statement" if it approves the proposal.

This report also proposes a Sphere of Influence for CSA #39 to take effect should it be formed. CSA facilities will be designed and constructed to serve the limited area of the project. Consequently, it is proposed that the Sphere of Influence be restricted to the proposed CSA boundary.

CONCLUSION: The issue before the Commission is that of governmental structure. The decisions on land use, design, and required services are the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors when reviewing the Tentative Map. It is proposed that Western World be served from several sources - City of Galt, Homeowner's Association, and CSA. The CSA can serve as an important coordinator of services to protect the interests of the property owners.

RECOMMENDATION: The following determinations are recommended:

- 1) Certify that the Commission has reviewed the County's EIR and adopt the "Statement of Overriding Considerations".
- 2) Approve the proposed formation with the boundary description as approved by the County Surveyor.
- 3) Authorize the Board of Supervisors to form CSA #39, pursuant to County Service Area Law, designating domestic water, storm drainage, sanitary sewer, street lighting, fire protection, and police protection as extended services.

4) Authorize the Board of Supervisors to establish service charges as necessary to maintain the facilities.

- 5) Pursuant to G.C. 54790.3, no property tax dollars shall be transferred to CSA #39.
- 6) Adopt a Sphere of Influence for CSA #39 which is the same as the boundary proposed for formation.



Atta: Vicinity Map Proposal Map



3. Impact: Noise

Mitigation:

The mitigation measures identified in the EIR could be included in the project after an acoustical study.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

Conditions can be attached to the project after an acoustical study has been made; or the project can be redesigned.

4. Impact: Air quality

Mitigation:

None feasible at this time.

Findings:

(2) Such changes or alterations are within the responsibility and jurisdiction of another public agency and not the agency making the finding. Such changes have been adopted by such other agency or can and should be adopted by such other agency.

Supporting facts:

It is possible to use emission banking in order to buy credits to compensate for the pollution caused by the project.

5. Impact: Circulation -

- A. Overburden of Liberty Road and Lower Sacramento Road.
- B. Overburden of intersection of Liberty and Lower Sacramento Roads.
- C. Overburden of intersection of Liberty and Frontage Road.
- D. Congestion at performance times.
- E. Lack of sufficient parking.

Mitigation:

The mitigation measures identified in the EIR including widening of roads; increasing sight distances; adding left and right turn lanes, emergency lanes, traffic signals or traffic control persons; lengthening of acceleration and deceleration lanes on State Route 99; meeting parking requirements; and redesign of parking plan.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

Data in the EIR and Staff Report substantiate the finding.

6. Impact: Loss of agricultural lands

Mitigation:

None

Findings:

(3) Specific eoncomic, social, or other considerations make infeasible the mitigation measures or project alternatives identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

A minimum amount of land will be taken out of agriculture. The reason for taking any of this land out of agriculture is to increase the County's economic, recreational and social goals. The goals of the County override the loss of agricultural land.

7. Impact: Fire and Police Protection

Mitigation:

Fire protection as detailed in Fire Warden's letter.
Police-private security force and/or contract with City of Galt or County Sheriff for full or supplemental protection.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

Testimony received during this hearing states that the impact will be mitigated; letter from the Fire Warden is a supporting fact to the finding; mitigation measures are noted in the EIR.

8. <u>Impact:</u> Schools

Mitigation:

The developer and the school districts shall negotiate an agreement for monetary contribution to the school districts before any subdivision or residential development is approved.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

Such agreements have been successful in past instances; the likelihood of children residing here is remote; testimony indicated that this would be restricted to children residing here; the developer would have to mitigate the problem if it does occur.

9. Impact: Sewage treatment

Mitigation:

The County should receive firm commitment from the City of Galt that they will provide sewer capacity for the total approved project. Developer to provide funds so that new treatment plant capacity will accommodate project's sewage.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

Testimony was received from the Galt City Council Vice-Mayor and the Chamber of Commerce to the effect that the sewer trunk line would be forthcoming to provide sewage treatment to this project.

10. Impact: Flooding

Mitigation:

The developer will be required to comply with all requirements of the County flood zones and the National Flood Insurance Program, based on a flood hazard report from the Corps of Engineers and specific design of the project.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

EIR notes that the property will be 48' above sea level; improvements, such as a culvert, etc., can be made by the developer. The contour map was shown; the red lines were put on by the Corps of Engineers showing a 41' flood level.

11. Impact: Water -

- A. Supply
- B. Usage
- C. Overdraft

Mitigation:

- A. Contract with City of Galt for well supply or interconnect existing wells to Galt's system.
- B. Determine economic and environmental feasibility of artificial lakes prior to any conditional approval.
- C. None.

Findings:

- (2) Such changes or alterations are within the responsibility and jurisdiction of another public agency and not the agency making the findings. Such changes have been adopted by such other agency or can and should be adopted by such other agency.
 - (A) All significant environmental effects that can feasibly be avoided have been eliminated or substantially lessened as determined through findings as described in Subsection (A).
 - (B) Any remaining, unavoidable significant effects have been found acceptable under Section 8.14 (15088).

Supporting facts:

Deletion of a large residential area reduces the amount of water usage needed; the applicant proposes an inter-connecting loop system with the City of Galt for water supply. Testimony was received that the residential and agricultural water uses were off-setting factors. It was stated that had the land been used in an agricultural endeavor it would use as much water as a residential endeavor. A pump is proposed to recirculate and aerate water.

12. Impact: Loss of vegetation and wildlife habitats

Mitigation:

Preserve large oaks. Preserve or replace riparian vegetation. Other mitigation measures as detailed in Department of Fish and Game letter response to EIR.

The EIR lists three other mitigation measures; the fish that are in existence in the area now will remain; water quality is to be protected. The State Department of Fish and Game suggested mitigation measures.

Findings:

(1) Changes or alterations have been required in, or incorporated into, the project which mitigate or avoid the significant environmental effects thereof as identified in the final EIR.

Supporting facts:

Letter from the State Department of Fish and Game noted in the Addendum to the EIR.

13. Impact: Energy consumption

Mitigation:

The mitigation measures identified in the EIR could be included in the project approval at the public hearing.

Findings:

Supporting facts:

Design of the project can be changed. Mitigation measures included in the EIR. The use of pumps can be a conserving factor in energy consumption. See EIR for on-site design.
